## THE HEAD'S PERSPECTIVE

### A Sense of Community

It is my belief that an academic department such as EAS should have a strong sense of community – a feeling of belonging, of loyalty; a somewhat common sense of purpose, vision and direction. Related concepts are departmental teamwork and camaraderie. Social psychologists define Sense of Community as:

“the perception of similarity to others, an acknowledged interdependence with others, a willingness to maintain this interdependence by giving to or doing for others what one expects from them, and the feeling that one is part of a larger dependable and stable structure” (Sarason, S.B., 1974, *The psychological sense of community: Prospects for a community psychology*. San Francisco: Jossey-Bass, p. 157.) – from [http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Sense\\_of\\_community](http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Sense_of_community).

Similarly, the *Building Strong Geoscience Departments* website (<http://serc.carleton.edu/departments/index.html>) identifies the following characteristics (and others) of a “thriving geoscience department”:

“They appear to know where they want to go and can articulate this to others; their vision is clear and compelling.”

“They are willing to take charge of their own destiny.”

“They are congenial and collaborative; they work hard and have fun; they are good colleagues and others come to their defense; they don't whine. The department as a whole, students, faculty and staff are happy and productive.”

"Successful recruiting of faculty leads to a diverse faculty with appropriate balance of skills and interests. They mentor their young faculty. Their staff like to work there and stay a long time."

So what does all of this mean for EAS? It is very easy in today's hectic and demanding world for students, faculty and staff to focus only (or too much) on one's own responsibilities and goals – to spend most of our time in our offices working on our own studies, projects, tasks, etc. Each of us feels the need to focus on the most important efforts and to devote the majority of our time to those efforts. However, developing (and displaying) a sense of community and departmental teamwork can improve the institution (the department, college and university) and improve the academic and work experience for each of us individually. Four approaches to enhancing our sense of community immediately come to mind:

Communication – enhanced professional and informal communication between members.

Participation, such as attending (as often as possible) seminars, meetings, receptions, meeting with visitors, and other departmental events.

Volunteering – we are often asked to participate in college, alumni or other events; or there are departmental needs that go beyond the traditional teaching and research functions.

Whenever possible, maintain a positive attitude and convey a positive view of colleagues, the department, college and university. There will always be challenges, but we can address them in a positive way. Related to conveying a positive and forward-thinking view, I was very pleased to observe at the EAS grad student recruiting booth and at the alumni reception at the recent GSA meeting several of our graduate students (as well as faculty and staff) enthusiastically talking with potential graduate students to explain our programs and to answer the potential students' questions.

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### POSTER PRINTING HOURS FOR AGU

In anticipation of the increased demand on the poster printer immediately before AGU, there will be signup sheets to reserve the printer from December 3-10. The printer may be reserved in one-hour increments. EAS IT staff members will work extra hours during the final weekend before AGU to provide support for last-minute printing. ## MAC OS X 10.5 LEOPARD AVAILABLE

Mac OS X 10.5 Leopard for personally-owned computers is now available for purchase at the BoilerCopyMaker (located in the Purdue Memorial Union). The cost is \$85 per copy. An initial stock of 50 copies is available, and more will be ordered if those sell quickly. A limit of three copies of Leopard per person is being imposed. Apple doesn't really care how many you would buy for your personally-owned Macs, but the economics lesson is this: It's cheaper to buy the five-license "family pack" if you have three or more machines (\$199 direct from Apple).

Computers that have been enrolled in the Apple Maintenance Program (which includes all former CLUE machines) will be upgraded after the beginning of the year. For those machines that were not enrolled, information regarding the campus license cost will be made available in next week's newsletter.

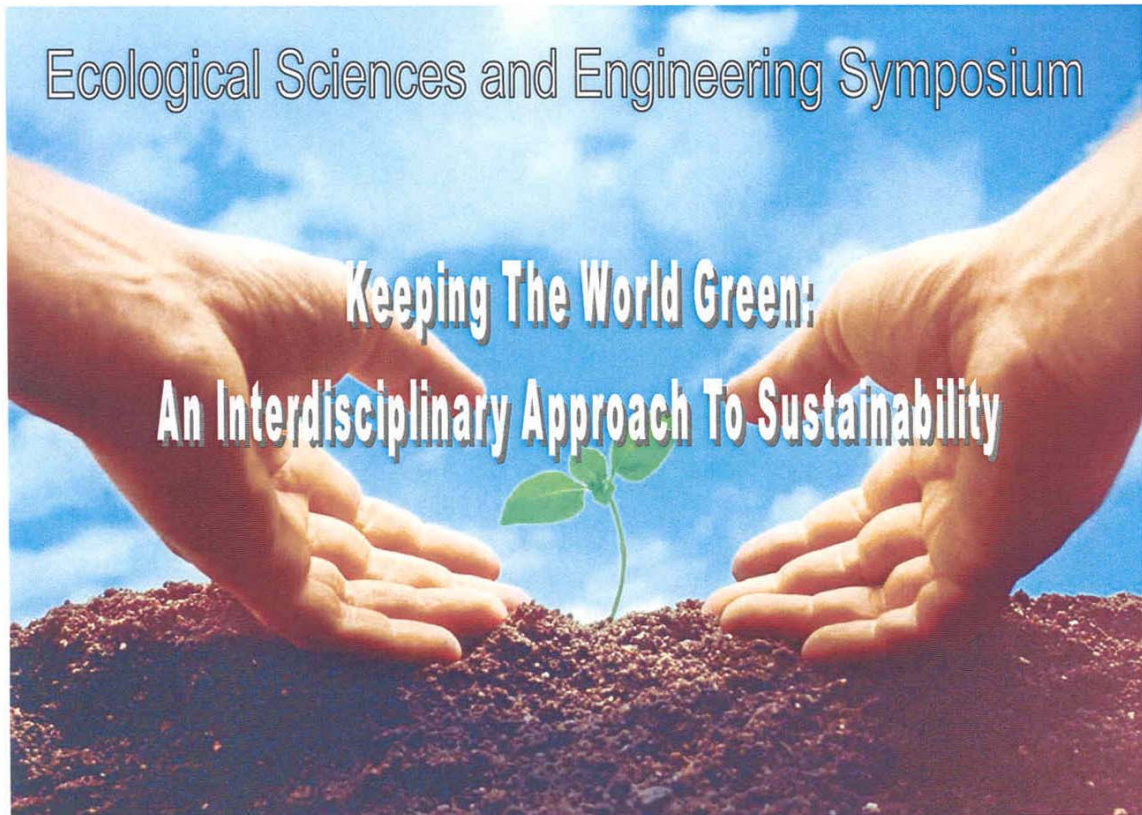
